



## 2019 Income and Resource Limits for Medicaid and Other Health Programs

Public benefit programs (such as Medicaid) use the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) guidelines to determine who qualifies for coverage. The table below includes the current income and resource limits someone needs to meet to qualify for Medicaid, CHIP, and Part D Extra Help this year. The income limits are based on the 2019 FPL guidelines that were published in February.

Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB)	Helps Medicare beneficiaries with Part A and B cost-sharing as well as the Part B premium	\$1,041 single \$1,410 married	\$7,730 single \$11,600 married
Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary (SLMB)	Helps Medicare beneficiaries pay the Part B premium	\$1,249 single \$1,691 married	\$7,730 single \$11,600 married
Qualified Individual (QI-1)	Helps Medicare beneficiaries pay the Part B premium	\$1,406 single \$1,903 married	\$7,730 single \$11,600 married

Medical Assistance for Workers with Disabilities (MAWD)	Full Medicaid coverage for individuals through age 64 who have a disability and who are able to do some work	\$2,603 single \$3,523 married	\$10,000 for single and married individuals
Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Waivers	Individuals age 60 and older and younger people who have certain disabilities and who meet level of care requirements can get support services to remain living as independently as possible and get full Medicaid coverage	\$2,313 (only applicant's income is counted)	\$8,000 (if married, the resources of both spouses are considered and spousal impoverishment rules apply)
Medicaid for Children and Pregnant Women	Full Medicaid coverage is available to children from birth through age 18 and Pregnant Women (the woman counts as 2 people or more depending on how many babies she is expecting).	Pregnant Women and children < 1: \$3,100 (HH size 2) \$3,911 (HH size 3) \$4,721 (HH size 4)  Children age 1-5: \$2,283 (HH size 2) \$2,880 (HH size 3) \$3,476 (HH size 4)  Children age 6-18: \$1,945(HH size 2) \$2,454 (HH size 3) \$2,961 (HH size 4)	Resources not counted
Medicare Part D Extra Help	Helps Medicare beneficiaries with their Part D (prescription drug) costs. Individuals who do <b>not</b> qualify for Medicaid must meet the income and resource limits shown here	<b>Full Subsidy</b> \$1,405 single \$1,902 married  <b>Partial Subsidy</b> \$1,561 single \$2,114 married	<b>Full Subsidy</b> \$9,230 single \$14,600 married  <b>Partial Subsidy</b> \$14,390 single \$28,720 married
Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)	Children who are not eligible for Medicaid and who do not have any other insurance can qualify for comprehensive coverage through CHIP.  Individuals who don't qualify for free or low-cost CHIP can buy CHIP at-cost.	Free CHIP: \$3,002 (HH size 2) \$3,786 (HH size 3) \$4,571 (HH size 4)  Low-Cost CHIP: \$4,495 (HH size 2) \$5,670 (HH size 3) \$6,845 (HH size 4)	Resources not counted
